# UAC Universities Admission Centre

## Your UAC PIN and Application Number

UAC sends your PIN (a 4 digit number) to the email address you have listed with the NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA) or the ACT Board of Senior Secondary Studies (ACT BSSS).

You need your PIN to access the application section of the UAC website. Once you have submitted an application, you will get a UAC Application Number.

It's important to save your UAC Application Number because you need it, along with your PIN, to make changes to your application and to access your offers.

## Change of Preference

After submitting your initial application, you can change and reorder your preferences as many times as you like, both before offers are made and/or between offer rounds.

You make these changes within your existing application which you access via the 'Manage Your Application' button at [www5.uac.edu.au/uacug](http://www5.uac.edu.au/uacug).

## How to List Your Preferences

The following is a good guide on how to think about your preferences:

### 1st Preference

Your dream, ideal course. This is the one you REALLY want to do. Throw your hat in the ring... you just never know!!

### 2nd, 3rd & 4th Preferences

The next three courses you most want to do if you don't get your "dream" course. You will need to consider your anticipated ATAR here.

### 5th Preference

This should be a course with a lower published ATAR that might give you entry into university. From here you can start a course, do very well in your first year and reapply for a preferred course based on your university study/academic record.

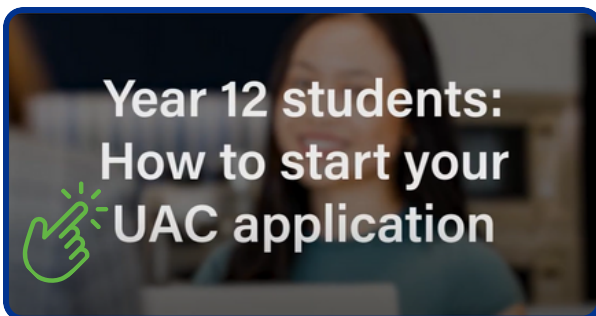

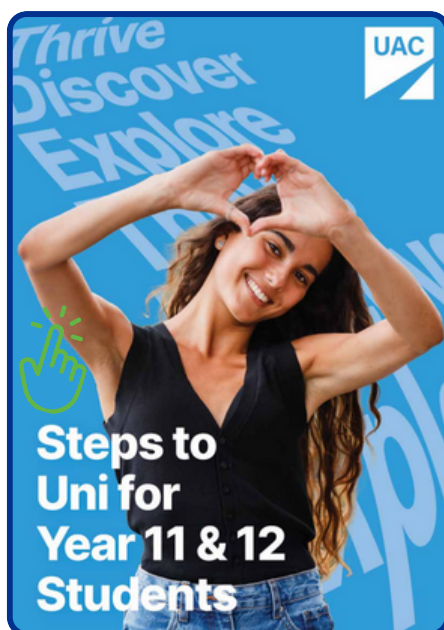

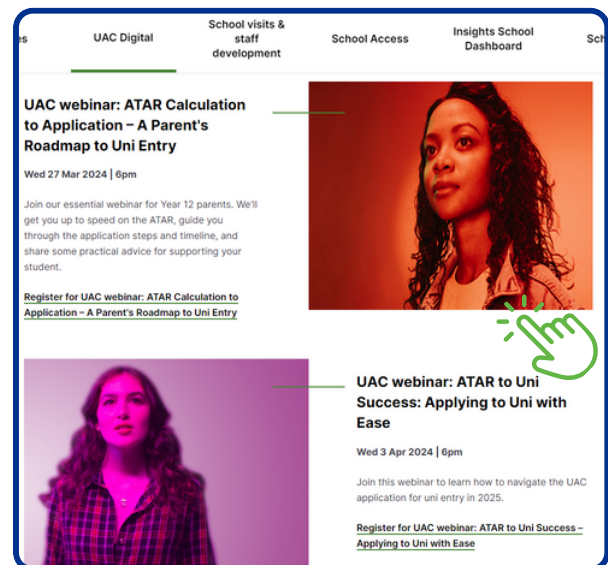

# Schools Recommendation Scheme

## What is the SRS?

Institutions can use the Schools Recommendation Scheme (SRS) to make you an early course offers using criteria other than, or in addition to, your ATAR.

SRS criteria can include your:

- School's rating of your aptitudes.
- Year 11 studies.
- Educational Access Scheme (EAS) application (if you've made one).

You're eligible to apply for the SRS if you're a domestic Year 12 student (from any state in Australia) or if you're completing the IB. International students are not eligible to apply.

## How Do I Apply?

- Follow the link displayed after you complete your UAC application.
- UAC will then ask your school to provide a professional assessment of your suitability for tertiary study.
- After your school has completed its assessment, your application will be processed by UAC and considered by participating institutions.

## SRS Dates

<b>3 April 2024</b>	SRS applications open 9am for NSW/ACT students.
<b>1 August 2024</b>	Interstate and IB student applications open.
<b>16 September 2024</b>	SRS applications close.
<b>8 November 2024</b>	First SRS offers.

## Types of SRS Offers

There are two types of SRS offers:

### Conditional

These require you to meet other criteria before the institution will make you an unconditional offer. Requirements may include:

- a minimum ATAR,
- course prerequisites,
- personal statement, portfolio, audition, interview or test.

### Unconditional

These offers have no other requirements you need to meet – you're in!

# Educational Access Scheme

## What is the EAS?

The Educational Access Scheme (EAS) may help if you faced difficult circumstances in Year 11 and/or 12.

If you qualify for EAS and your ATAR is lower than required for a course, a university might raise your selection rank which increases your chance of receiving an offer.

Note that every university has different rules about how they use EAS, so while it can certainly help your application, it can't guarantee you an offer.

## Am I Eligible?

To apply for EAS you must:

- Be a domestic student. International students cannot apply.
- Demonstrate that your studies were negatively affected in Year 11 and/or 12.

## EAS Doesn't Apply If...

- The difficult circumstances arise after September, because they will not impact your Year 12 performance.
- Illness or misadventure impacts your final exams – NESA has a different process for this.

## EAS Dates

**3 April  
2024**

EAS applications open.

**21 November  
2024**

Deadline to submit EAS application and documents to guarantee you receive your EAS eligibility letter after release of HSC results and ATARs and before the deadline to change preferences for December Round 2.

**7 February  
2025**

EAS applications close.

## How Do I Apply?



**Start your EAS application early!**

It can involve time consuming tasks like collating documents, going to appointments, and getting other people to write statements.

# Educational Access Scheme

This is a quick summary of categories for which you may be eligible. You still need to [view the specific criteria](#) and supporting evidence requirements for each category.

It's also a good idea to [check that the institution\(s\) you're applying to participate in](#) EAS.

## EAS covers 9 categories:

- Disrupted schooling
- Financial challenges
- Severe family disruption
- Excessive family responsibilities
- English language difficulties
- Personal illness/disability
- Refugee and humanitarian status
- School environment
- Socio-economic disadvantage

## Disadvantage Codes

### Disrupted Schooling

Code	Eligibility criteria
<b>D01A</b>	You attended three or more different secondary schools in Australia during Years 10, 11 and 12 or equivalent.
<b>D01B</b>	You moved to Australia after the beginning of Year 11 and English is your first language.
<b>D01C</b>	You moved interstate during Year 11 and/or Year 12 or equivalent.
<b>S01D</b>	You studied any of your Year 12 courses through distance education, an Access program or School of Now as a result of circumstances beyond your control or choosing.

### Financial Challenges

*You should claim all financial challenges that apply to you. You cannot claim F01C if you are eligible for F01A or F01B.*

Code	Eligibility criteria
<b>F01A</b>	You received Youth Allowance, Austudy or ABSTUDY during Year 11 and/or 12 or equivalent.
<b>F01B</b>	You received another Centrelink means tested benefit such as the Disability Support Pension.
<b>F01C</b>	You experienced exceptional challenges during Year 11 and/or Year 12 or equivalent.
<b>F01D</b>	Your parent/s or guardian/s received Family Tax Benefit Part A during Year 11 and/or Year 12 or equivalent.



# Educational Access Scheme

## Severe Family Disruption

Code	Eligibility criteria
H01A	Your home environment was severely disrupted due to the death of an immediate family member or close friend during Year 11 and/or 12 or equivalent.
H01B	Your home environment was severely disrupted due to the severe or life-threatening illness/disability of an immediate family member or close friend.
H01C	Your home environment was severely disrupted due to the relationship breakdown & separation of your parents during Year 11 and/or 12 or equivalent. OR You (the applicant) experienced separation due to relationship breakdown.
H01D	Your home environment was severely disrupted due to criminal/legal matters during Year 11 and/or 12 or equivalent.
H04A	You, or your parents, or any of your siblings have experienced severe abuse for a period of at least six months during Year 11 and/or 12 or equivalent.
H04B	You are currently placed, or have previously been placed, with an Out of Home Care provider due to government agency intervention.
N01D	Your education has been negatively impacted during Year 11 and/or 12 or equivalent due to the impact of a natural disaster. Natural disasters in Australia can include, but are not limited to, heatwaves, bushfires, droughts, floods, severe storms and tropical cyclones, earthquakes, tsunamis and landslides.

## Excessive Family Responsibilities

Code	Eligibility criteria
H03A	You've had excessive responsibility for care of children and/or other family members during Year 11 and/or 12 or equivalent.
H03B	You've had excessive work requirements during Year 11 and/or 12 or equivalent for at least one of the following: <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• supporting yourself, while living independently</li><li>• supporting your family</li><li>• responsibility to work in the family business</li></ul>
H03C	You've had excessive responsibility for the care of yourself, while living independently, with no family or partner support, during Year 11 and/or Year 12 or equivalent.

# Educational Access Scheme

## English Language Difficulty

Code	Eligibility criteria
<b>L01A</b> <i>Domestic Year 12 applicants only</i>	All of the following: <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• you are a current Australian Year 12 applicant</li><li>• you experience difficulty with the English language</li><li>• you came directly to Australia from a non-English speaking country</li><li>• you began your education in an Australian school in Year 11 and/or Year 12 or equivalent.</li></ul>
<b>L01B</b> <i>Domestic Year 12 applicants only</i>	All of the following: <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• you are a current Australian Year 12 applicant</li><li>• you experience difficulty with the English language</li><li>• you came directly to Australia from a non-English speaking country</li><li>• you began your education in an Australian school during Years 7–10.</li></ul>

## Personal Illness/Disability

Code	Eligibility criteria
<b>P01A</b>	If during Year 11 and/or 12 or equivalent you experienced: <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• a severe and long-term or a severe and recurrent medical/psychiatric condition or disability</li></ul> OR <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• a learning, sensory, physical, psychological or other disability/disorder.</li></ul>

## Refugee and Humanitarian Status

Code	Eligibility criteria
<b>R01A</b>	You are, or have previously been, the holder of one of the following Australian refugee visas: <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Global Special Humanitarian (subclass 202)</li><li>• Humanitarian Stay (subclass 449)</li><li>• Protection visa (subclass 866)</li><li>• Refugee visas (subclass 200, 201, 203 and 204)</li><li>• Resolution of Status visa (subclass 851)</li><li>• Safe Haven Enterprise visa (subclass 790)</li><li>• Temporary Humanitarian Concern visa (subclass 786)</li><li>• Temporary Protection visa (subclass 785)</li></ul>

# Educational Access Scheme

## UAC automatically generate an EAS application for you, if:

- The residential address you enter in your UAC undergraduate application is identified by the Australian Bureau of Statistics as being in the lowest 25% of socio-economic disadvantage in Australia.
- You currently attend a school classified as an Australian rural, regional or remote school identified as inner regional, outer regional, remote or very remote according to the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) Australian Statistical Geography Standard – Remoteness Area (ASGS-RA).

## School Environment

Code	Eligibility criteria
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- |             |  |
|-------------|--|
| <b>S01R</b> | <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• If you are completing Year 12 at a regional, rural and/or remote school in Australia, UAC will automatically generate an 'electronic' application for you. You will receive an email notification of this within 24 hours of submitting your undergraduate application. If you receive this notification, do not claim this category in your EAS application.</li><li>• Only claim this category manually in your EAS application if you attended a regional, rural and/or remote school during Year 11 or 12 and have since transferred to a school in a metropolitan area.</li><li>• If you have manually claimed S01R in your EAS application, you will need to provide supporting documents.</li></ul> |

## Socio-economic Disadvantage

Code	Eligibility criteria

| <b>AG01 &amp; AG02</b> | <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• After you've applied for undergraduate admission through UAC, they will automatically generate an electronic EAS application for you (i.e.: you don't have to submit an application) if the residential address you entered in your UAC undergraduate application is identified by the Australian Bureau of Statistics as being in the lowest 25% of socio-economic disadvantage in Australia.</li></ul> |

# Applying From Interstate

## How to Apply

Once you know the courses you're applying for, the application will take you about 20 minutes. Here's a checklist of what you need to apply:

- A personal email address to start your application.
- Your Year 12 student number (you'll also be asked to enter a PIN, which is your date of birth – you can change it after you've applied).
- Your Unique Student Identifier (USI) (if you don't have one, [create your USI](#)).
- Your UCAT candidate number, if you're apply for a medicine degree.
- Your chosen courses (up to five if you're a domestic applicant for undergraduate study) and their course codes, which can be found on the course search on UAC's website and in the dropdown menu in the application itself
- A credit card (MasterCard or Visa) to pay the processing fee. You can also pay by BPay.
